

St. Paul's Annual Meeting

On Sunday, January 26, St. Paul's held its annual meeting. It took place in the church sanctuary during our normal Christian Education hour at 10:00.

The hour consisted of different leaders in the church, each giving a short talk about their ministry and the past years' activities. After two prayers to open the meeting, the following reports were offered:



Michael Walters-Young, Treasurer

Michael began by discussing the budgeting process and how the Finance Committee recommended the budget to the vestry. For 2025, St. Paul's will be working with a balanced budget. The operating

budget for 2025, which includes pledges as well as cash/plate is \$1,231,471. The overall revenues have increased for the pariah but that is offset with increased expenses for items such as Outreach (we are now giving over \$110,000 for community needs), Diocesan Fair Share, Utilities, and COLA salary increases. This also includes a reserve fund of about \$11,000. The Finance Committee and Vestry is proud of this budget and what it says about the values of our parish.

Ron Howes, Junior Warden

As the vestry member who oversees the physical plant of our church, we have seen much in the way of building activity. Obviously, the new construction has been a major focus of the church but other items have been front and center. Barnabas had a broken water pipe that caused us to make some needed but unexpected repairs. The fire alarm system broke down and we had to get a new one installed, even in the middle of construction. And we moved the church offices, temporarily, to Barnabas while construction is occurring.

Needless to say, it was a very busy year for the Senior Warden. Pam highlighted the following events:

- 1. The above-mentioned water pipe burst in Barnabas and our response in getting it repaired quickly.
- 2. The annual vestry retreat and the Mutual Ministry Review, facilitated by Molly Dale smith.
- 3. Coordination of the temporary move to Barnabas, with so many St. Paul members helping.
- 4. Working with our partners for a successful building campaign (906 architects, Solomon Builders, First Horizon Bank, the Diocese, and Susan Miller who is our project manager.
- 5. Bringing in new faces to our staff, Brett Smith (Youth Minister) and Rachel Shoaf (Nursery supervisor).

The building and renovation project began in November and is currently right on schedule! Demolition was the first activity and now it is moving into the building phase as we begin the year. We want to thank everyone for their support and patience during this exciting but challenging time.

Stewardship on Display (aka 2024 Annual Parish Meeting)



- Our Treasurer, Michael Walters Young showed us that our Vestry and Finance committee carefully budget and prepare for the fiscal future and continue to protect our Clergy and Staff from inflation, while maintaining a balanced budget that is forward thinking.
- Susan Miller continued her gifts of work coordinating and communicating about our building project, sharing about that as well.

A paper copy of the Annual Report was distributed and details many of our ministries in worship, inreach, and outreach that occurred in 2024 and will continue in 2025. Building Project Update

We are nearly 100% complete with Demolition, except for the remaining existing restroom currently still being used. The restroom demo will happen hopefully after the new restrooms are functioning. We are 10.5% complete with the total project. The poured concrete foundation is complete and the new concrete block wall is being constructed this week and next. The underground new sewer lines have been laid, ready for new restrooms and kitchens to be built.

In the next week 906 Architects will be making a couple of brick mock up walls to evaluate brick selection for the new upper story. It's a fine art selecting a brick and mortar product that will blend with the existing brick. You may now notice the older brick on Founder's Hall is different from the newer brick on the main corridor facade and Otey Hall. It is virtually impossible to find the exact brick from 40 years ago. The intent is to have the brick blend as well as possible in order to appear seamless.

Holes were cut into Founder's Hall ceiling in order to run gas and water lines to their destination. This week our contractors will be patching and repainting those areas. Outside a new grip paint product will be applied to the ramp leading into Founder's Hall. This should help prevent slipping when wet. Let's please all be aware of these kinds of hazards during construction. Also the ceiling has been demoed in the passage from the Sacristy leading into Founder's Hall. This room and Kristy's old office shows where two buildings were joined together at some point. It's interesting to see the old construction and poses some thoughts of how the new construction will be solved. Solomon and 906 Architects are working on the solution. Kristy's old office space will eventually be a Robe Room leading into the Sacristy. We will also install an ADA safety lift to navigate the stairs going into the church.

There are many things happening with our construction project, one by one all will get finished. This is an exciting time for St. Paul's! Please stay curious and thank you for all your support.




Bad Girls Book Club

The Senson of Lent ALSI. Pauls

The season now known as Lent (from an Old English word meaning "spring," the time of lengthening days) has a long history. Originally, Lent was "a season of penitence and fasting," the time of preparation for those who were to be baptized, at the Easter Vigil, the celebration of the Resurrection of the Lord early on Easter Sunday. But since these new members were to be received into a living community of Faith, the entire community was called to preparation. Also, this was the time when those who had been separated from the Church would prepare to rejoin the community.

Today, during the season of Lent all Christians are invited "to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word."

In the western church the forty days of Lent extend from Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday, omitting Sundays. The last three days of Lent are the sacred Triduum of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. The number 40 is connected with many biblical events, but especially with the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for His ministry by facing the temptations that could lead him to abandon his mission and calling.



The color used in the sanctuary for most of Lent is purple. This is the color of royalty, and so anticipates through the suffering and death of Jesus, the coming resurrection of Christ as the King of Kings, celebrated on Easter Sunday. There are no beautiful flowers on the altar during Lent, but only greenery or nothing at all. There are no Alleluias said within the liturgies, and there is no celebratory sounding music, but rather music that tends to be more somber.

Ash Wednesday

Wednesday March 5 is Ash Wednesday, marking the beginning of the penitential Season of Lent, in the church. Ashes are an ancient sign of penitence. From the Middle Ages it became the custom to begin Lent (the forty days before Easter) by being marked in ash with the sign of the cross. The reminder that we are dust turns our attention to the creative power of God, and God's ability to heal the brokenness in our lives when we offer that brokenness to God. That turning to God is the work of Lent, preparation for the celebration of Jesus's resurrection on Easter Day.


In January, the Outreach committee provided for several organizations that we have previously assisted. We gave the following:

Financial Performance for the month of December 2024

December Summary: Another year is complete, and the parish came close to meeting its financial expectations. When non-operating accounts are taken into consideration, the parish broke even.

Revenues: Total revenues were under budget by 2.1%. Congregational giving for the year was nearly there - 0.8% under expectations. The largest underperforming revenue was to not take teh use of monies from investments and endowment earnings as teh parish is stable enough.

Expenses: Expenses were 9.3% below budget for the month and are still 1.7% below budget for the year. A new account - 520.00 Vestry Meetings Expenses - has been added to the Operating Expenses which is a breakout of charges previously accounted for under Misc. Operating. For the year, we were 0.7% under budgeted expenses.

Overall: The parish ended with a preliminary operating deficit of \$29,427 or about 2-3% over budget, but when non-budgeted accounts are added the overall surplus or about 1%.
