

Building Project Update

Capital Campaign Informational Meeting

On Thursday, March 20, we will hold a discussion concerning our updated construction project. meeting will begin at 5:30 in Barnabas. The crux of the meeting is to answer any questions about the project, especially for those who are new to the church and may want to know more about it. However, the meeting is open to everyone who might have a question or two and also would like to involved in its completion. Hope to see you then.





Building Project Apolate

Our Building Project was somewhat slowed over the last two weeks due to weather, however our contractors were there every day doing what was possible through the rain, snow, and freezing temperatures. This week and the coming weeks ahead we will begin to see substantial progress as the concrete floors will be poured and vertical steel beam structures installed. The new concrete block wall is now higher than our neighbors building and will continue to be completed after the horizontal beams are installed. Progress will begin happening faster then.

The underground plumbing is complete and has been inspected by the city. A heavy duty plastic water barrier is being installed on top of the gravel bed and will be ready for the concrete floor to be poured. The elevator shaft subfloor and walls have been completed and the walls will start going up after the floor is poured. A brick and mortar mock up sample has been approved by our design team and it will blend beautifully with the existing brick.


The elevation view from West Main Street will remain the same with new doors and windows. The upper story will be visual but be recessed from the double door entrance. The Reception Room inside will be where Shannon's old office and the vestibule were.

There will be another door leading into Kristy's old office area that will have a cloak room for acolytes, then will lead into the little hallway to go into church. This is where an ADA lift will be installed to help folks manage the stairs leading into the Sanctuary.

The flooring in this entire area will be gray and cream, harlequin set, porcelain tiles that simulate stone. The walls in the Reception will be wall to wall green painted shelving and drawer storage. The shelving will allow for things like St. Paul's merchandise and crafts to be sold. We may also have room for things like Prayer Books, Hymnals, icons, art etc.

Also, we may have bags of food ready to go. We will have the opportunity to serve the hungry, the needy, tourists, newcomers, and parishioners alike. A receptionist or volunteer will be able to sit at a custom built in desk and greet folks as they enter our new office / classroom hall.

Our contractors are still on schedule and our finish date is set for October-November 2025. We are currently 97.5% finished with demolition (we still have an existing functioning restroom) and 13.95% over all complete in construction.

In the following two weeks, we will have a beam signing event. We believe we will do this on a Sunday after church, and if you are so inclined you can come into the site and sign your name on a steel beam before it is installed. More details will be coming soon.

Thank you for your enthusiasm and patience as we walk through this exciting journey together.




Bad Girls Book Club





The Senson of Lent ALSI. Pauls

The season now known as Lent (from an Old English word meaning "spring," the time of lengthening days) has a long history. Originally, Lent was "a season of penitence and fasting," the time of preparation for those who were to be baptized, at the Easter Vigil, the celebration of the Resurrection of the Lord early on Easter Sunday. But since these new members were to be received into a living community of Faith, the entire community was called to preparation. Also, this was the time when those who had been separated from the Church would prepare to rejoin the community.

Today, during the season of Lent all Christians are invited "to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word."

In the western church the forty days of Lent extend from Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday, omitting Sundays. The last three days of Lent are the sacred Triduum of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. The number 40 is connected with many biblical events, but especially with the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for His ministry by facing the temptations that could lead him to abandon his mission and calling.



The color used in the sanctuary for most of Lent is purple. This is the color of royalty, and so anticipates through the suffering and death of Jesus, the coming resurrection of Christ as the King of Kings, celebrated on Easter Sunday. There are no beautiful flowers on the altar during Lent, but only greenery or nothing at all. There are no Alleluias said within the liturgies, and there is no celebratory sounding music, but rather music that tends to be more somber.



Ash Wednesday

Wednesday March 5 is Ash Wednesday, marking the beginning of the penitential Season of Lent, in the church. Ashes are an ancient sign of penitence. From the Middle Ages it became the custom to begin Lent (the forty days before Easter) by being marked in ash with the sign of the cross. The reminder that we are dust turns our attention to the creative power of God, and God's ability to heal the brokenness in our lives when we offer that brokenness to God. That turning to God is the work of Lent, preparation for the celebration of Jesus's resurrection on Easter Day.

Needs for Care That Stephen Ministers Can Meet

- Those who are grieving the loss of a loved one
- People who are hospitalized

- Parents who have children leaving home for the military, college, marriage, or work in another geographical area

Historic Reflections

Bicentennial Society

Honoring St. Paul's 200th Anniversary

Our St. Paul's Episcopal Church was founded on August 25th, 1827, in a room of the Hiram Masonic Lodge #7 in Franklin when those persons "friendly to the formation of an Episcopal church in the area" met under the leadership of Reverend James Hervey Otey. Honored as the "Mother Church of the Diocese of Tennessee," St. Paul's led the way for Episcopal congregations to bloom throughout our state.

Today, there are three organizations committed to preserving the legacy of St. Paul's.

- The Historic Committee focuses on preserving our past and securing our future by supporting various projects and events that are not provided for in St. Paul's annual budget.
- **The Bicentennial Committee**, which is overseen by The Historic Committee, is responsible for planning and executing activities connected with the Bicentennial in 2027.
- **The Bicentennial Society** is a fundraising entity dedicated to providing financial support for the work of both the Historic and Bicentennial Committees.

Examples of projects that have been funded by the Bicentennial Society include:

Education: We are hosting several historic symposiums on Franklin's early churches and their role in sowing the seeds that helped make Franklin a vibrant, growing community. Financial Performance for the month of January 2025

January Summary: One month into the fiscal year and the parish is where it wants to be - in an incredibly strong financial position.

Revenues: Technically, pledges were severely below where we would have anticipated they be...but that is not really the truth as we had nearly a quarter of a million dollars worth of prepaid pledges received ahead of the start of the year and recognized in January. Taking into account the regular monthly pledges received, the parish has actually raised 30% of all of its expected income for the year - in one month. **Expenses:** Expenses were \$8 (8!) over budget. Within the expense budget, Health Insurance was higher due to funding an employee's HSA account for 6 months, the Rectors Entertainment line had the Vestry and Staff Christmas party, the Property Maintenance line had costs for the crane that was needed to fix light fixtures at Barnabas and the Sexton line had two reissued for two invoices for 2024.

Overall: The parish starts the year nearly \$244,000 to the good.
